Next to each name write 2-3 objects that you associate with that person. Be really specific-include the color, shape, condition of the object, location and the senses. Create an Object Poem of that person repeating the structure, You Are Example: You are the black Harry Potter magic wand that you use to cast spells on us all day long. You are the small green frog that you caught and cried about when you had to let it go. You are The Nature Book on snakes that you have memorized in obsessive detail. Volunteers read their poems to the group-others try to guess the relationship to that person.

In groups of 4 select one of the characters to discuss. Share the words & objects from the text that caught your attention and help describe the character.
